Graue Feature – Anthony Plummer – Class of '22

When planning for the Graue Spring newsletter back in Fall, we realized how little we knew about how the Spring newsletter came to be. Our questions led us to Anthony Plummer, a former Graue President, current Intern and Co-Op Lead at Lockheed Martin, and a man who was with the newsletter at the beginning.

When we sat down with Anthony, the conversation quickly shifted to Graue. Anthony said that the accomplishment he was most proud of from his time in Graue was helping start up the Spring newsletter. Prior to the Spring newsletter, Erick got feedback from alumni that they wanted to be more connected to the Graue Scholars post-graduation, and to be able to see what our current students are up to. This sparked the initial idea of the newsletter, to send out to alumni with updates and pictures every Spring. Anthony joined Graue on the Alumni Relations team as they were given this project, and he got to work through the whole process of the newsletter being produced. Later, Anthony became the head of the Alumni Relations committee, and really focused on refining the process, and making it the best that it could be. Anthony focused on behind-the-scenes logistics and made sure that the newsletter could always be produced from year to year. He started a standardized process to release high-quality work, and he created a timeline highlighting deadlines and due dates that the Alumni Relations committee still uses today!

Along with Anthony's pivotal role in creating the Spring newsletter, he also served as Graue President.
Unfortunately, Anthony's term was interrupted by COVID, which made things more difficult, but he persevered. Anthony said that everything was online, and there was less traveling than usual for the Graues, but, despite the challenges and extra hard work, he found it to be a very rewarding experience.

Following his time with Graue, we asked more about what he's doing for work. Anthony told us that he is the Intern and Co-Op Program lead at Lockheed Martin, which oversees the ~2,000 interns across the country enrolled in their internship and Co-Op program. Anthony just recently received this promotion in the past few months and has been loving every second of it. Anthony said that this felt like the perfect position for him to be in, because he was an intern with Lockheed Martin while he was in college. Although the transition was swift, and the role has its challenges, Anthony really enjoys the work. He said that he works with a solid team with a strong understanding of the program, which has made his transition easier.



One of Anthony's goals for the internship program at Lockheed Martin is to not force the interns to change. He said Lockheed Martin's main goal is to make sure their interns have the best experience

possible, even if it means they change roles within the company.

show interns that Lockheed Martin can be an employer of choice for the future, and to make sure their experience is consistent throughout the organization, no matter what department they are working for. One of Anthony's most rewarding parts of his career so far has been seeing the development of the people he has brought through the company. He said seeing how excited students are at career fairs, and then being able to see their development and progress throughout the company has been extremely rewarding.

Looking back on his time at the U of I and as a Graue Scholar, Anthony said that being in the Graue Scholars program allowed him to prepare and better succeed in his position at Lockheed Martin. Anthony mentioned that being in the workforce is a lot like a group project to him. He said that while in the workplace, it's common to work with friends, but that it's almost as common to work with people you don't get along as well with. Anthony said that his time at the U of I, and especially his time with the Graue Scholars, helped him better prepare for the workplace postgraduation. Anthony's takeaway was that being a Graue Scholar helped him gain the leadership skills and interpersonal skills that he has carried with him into his career.

Reflecting more on his time as a Graue Scholar, we asked Anthony what some of his favorite memories were during his four years. Anthony said that his first Spring Break Graue trip was to San Francisco in 2019. He loved seeing the Golden Gate Bridge, but didn't realize how far of a walk it would be across the entire bridge! Anthony also said that his most memorable company visited was AT&T in Dallas.

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He also remembered how cool the building was and how interesting it was to hear their history and story as a company.

Being able to talk with Anthony answered our questions about the newsletter, but our conversation with him taught us so much more. Getting to hear firsthand how Anthony's experiences with Graue have helped him in the workplace is uplifting as a current Graue Scholar, and it has gotten us excited to do more. Anthony made sure that the newsletter would carry on after he graduated, but on an even deeper level, he's continuing to leave a mark on the hearts and minds of the Graue Scholars through his successes and positive example.

Spring Trip

The Graue Scholars enjoyed another successful Spring Networking Trip in 2025, traveling to Boise, Idaho. As the state's capital and one of its fastest-growing cities, Boise serves as a major hub for business and is home to one of the College of Business and Economics' largest alumni bases. This combination made for a highly engaging and productive experience.

The first stop of the trip was a major highlight: Micron Technology. The Graue Scholars explored the company's expansive 340-acre Boise campus, which is currently undergoing a \$15 billion memory manufacturing plant upgrade. Students from Washington State University and Kyoto University in Japan joined the Graues for a comprehensive overview of the company. The visit included a VIP tour of the facility, in-depth insight into company operations, and a panel discussion featuring Micron leadership and recent hires.



Following Micron, the group visited Stoltz Marketing, a local woman-owned firm behind some of Boise's most recognizable campaigns. The visit provided a unique perspective on the personal side of marketing and the importance of value alignment in business relationships. One of Stoltz's most recent projects—a complete rebranding of Boise's public transportation system—was on full display throughout the city during the Scholars' visit.

The day wrapped up with a networking dinner attended by more than 25 CBE alumni. This event was a major highlight of the trip, offering students meaningful opportunities to connect with graduates currently working in industry. Among the attendees was Jim Steele, chairman of the "Initiators" segment of the campaign that helped launch the Graue Scholars program. A proud member of the Class of 1956, Steele played a vital role in establishing the program and laying the foundation for its continued success.

Day two brought visits to Clearwater Analytics,
Oppenheimer Companies, Inc., and ESI Construction. At
Clearwater, students learned about the role of
automation in investment accounting. At Oppenheimer,
they witnessed the value of working at a family-owned

business, and at ESI Construction, they toured the company's brand-new headquarters and heard about its rapid growth in the commercial construction sector.

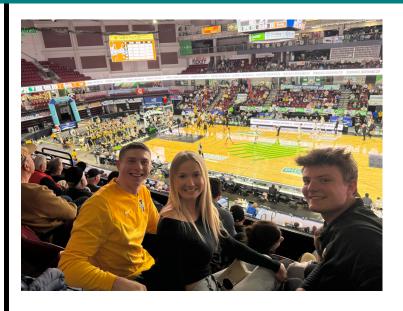
The trip concluded with visits to Eide Bailly LLP and Caprock Wealth Management. At Eide Bailly, students gained insight into life at a major accounting firm during its busiest season, with valuable input from several University of Idaho alumni. At Caprock, the group engaged in thoughtful discussions about preparing for post-college success and received advice on entering the fields of private investment and wealth management. Altogether, the Scholars visited eight companies—nearly double the number from last year's trip.

Of course, the trip wasn't all business. The Scholars took time to bond with each other throughout the trip and at TopGolf during a night of friendly competition. Some students even caught the University of Idaho Men's and Women's Basketball teams in action at the Big Sky Tournament in Boise, which coincided with the visit.

The 2025 Spring Networking Trip offered the Graue Scholars another great opportunity for professional development, alumni engagement, and personal connection. Through the company tours, leadership discussions, and immersive experiences, students walked away with a deeper understanding of the industries they hope to enter and the networks they are now part of. The Boise trip not only expanded their knowledge—it solidified the value of the Graue Scholars program in preparing students for successful careers beyond the classroom.

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CBE 100 Year Anniversary Interview with the Dean

As the College of Business and Economics (CBE) celebrates its 100th anniversary, Dean Lisa Victoravich reflects on her time at the University of Idaho and looks toward future opportunities. Under the Dean's leadership, innovation has flourished alongside the CBE's mission to prepare students for future leadership roles and successful careers. Since taking on the role as Dean, thanks to the contributions and efforts of the faculty, the college has expanded its academic offerings to better suit the needs of the students, including the addition of two online programs: the Bachelor of **Business Administration and Master of Business** Administration. These programs were created to provide further flexibility and remote access to students well beyond the Moscow city limits. To support the Holistic Student Journey, the centerpiece of the new strategic plan, she has introduced the new role of Student Experience Coordinator to improve student engagement and the overall community of the CBE.

Looking forward, Dean Victoravich will focus on student retention and continued growth of the college. Programmatic goals include the creation of more master's degrees and perhaps someday launching a Ph.D. Program. Creation of a Ph.D. program, which would require significant development and faculty approval stages.

The CBE 100-year anniversary is a time of reflection, and to do so the college has created a <u>timeline</u> showing the history of the college and its accomplishments and will host a Grand Finale Celebration on October 10th. Some of her most rewarding experiences since she became the dean have been standing on stage during commencement ceremonies and being able to congratulate graduates while handing them their degrees. Interacting with and creating connections with CBE Alumni has also been a deeply rewarding experience for Dean Victoravich.

With the celebration of 100 years as a college, the CBE is prepared to continue building its legacy and shaping the future of business education for many generations. Dean Lisa Victoravich is proud to continue this journey for the students at the University of Idaho.
