### Teaching Staff:

## Location/Travel:

The LRGA classroom activities will be held at the Owyhee County Community Building in Homedale (432 W. Nevada Ave). Field exercises will be held at McIntyre Farms, just across the Snake River from Marsing. McIntyre Farms is a diversified crop and livestock operation where they raise grass-finished beef, pastured pigs, pastured poultry for both egg and meat production, a variety of crops, and have an on farm retail store.

Homedale is located about 35 miles west of Boise. There are several vacation rentals (Airbnb or VRBO) as well as a couple of RV campgrounds in the area. Hotels are available in Caldwell or Nampa.

All days begin at 8:00 a.m. with continental breakfast, and the noon meal may be a working lunch.
